This weeks spotlight - Reading at Dilton Marsh school

Reading is always high on our agenda and over the past two years we have invested heavily, both in time and money, into ensuring that all our children become fluent readers. We begin by teaching reading through *Little Wandle Letters and Sounds Revised*. This is a systematic synthetic phonics programme. We teach phonics in Reception and Year 1 and as additional phonics support from Year 2 up to ensure our readers become fluent. We teach children how to sound talk and blend unfamiliar words, over time children then build up a bank of words they can then read automatically. Some words are not easily decodable and can often be called 'Tricky Words' such as, 'was' and 'they'. We teach these words so that the children learn and can identify the part of the word which is 'tricky'.

We teach our phonics and reading in a structured way to ensure that children are not cognitively overloaded. Children know the routines for their phonics lessons and are exposed to a maximum of four new sounds (phonemes) a week. The thing that makes the most difference to the children, regardless of age, is practice. Through regular practice, new learning is embedded and new neural pathways are created.

This message was the subject of the conference which Miss Tout and I attended on Tuesday. The speakers were all influential in developing good practice in all schools. These included the author of the Reading Framework, a HMI inspector and Michael Morpurgo. All the speakers were encouraging schools to develop reading for pleasure as research shows that children who read for pleasure do better in life; they are happier and healthier and more creative.

We were enthralled as Michael Morpurgo read one of his own poems and described how his love for reading and then writing developed. He talked with great fondness about the special times he can remember when his mother read to him and his brother at the end of the day. He described his own love of reading to his children, grandchildren and now great grandchildren! He then shared information about his latest campaign supporting dads reading to their children. He explained how many boys are turned off of reading at an early age and how they don't have the role models to share that love. 
